For those looking to sharpen their social media game, WSG is hosting a webinar on January 13 with **Jonathan Ottke** and **Eric Celarier**. They'll share tips on building your online presence and connecting with audiences.

Don't forget about WSG's monthly Virtual Happy Hour, held every second Wednesday from 6–7pm. These informal gatherings are a great way to share what you're working on, ask questions, or simply catch up with fellow members.

As 2024 ends with its mix of reflection and celebration, it's impossible to ignore the current complex state of the world around us. Artina 2024: A Point of View

WSG Members Showcase Different Perspectives in Artina 2024: A Point of View

Twenty-one Washington sculptors were selected by juror **Nehemiah Dixon III**, Senior Director for Programs and Community Engagement at The Phillips Collection, to participate in *Artina 2024: A Point of View*. This annual outdoor sculpture exhibition, a collaboration between the Washington Sculptors Group (WSG) and Sandy Spring Museum, challenged artists to explore the layered meanings of perspective in their work.

The open call invited submissions of both existing and newly created works, with a focus on site-specific installations that responded to the outdoor exhibition space. All sculptures were required to be durable, capable of withstanding the elements with minimal maintenance, thus ensuring their longevity in the natural setting of Sandy Spring Museum.

Nehemiah Dixon III reflected on the thematic depth of "a point of view", noting its versatility and relevance across physical, mental, and artistic domains. "The phrase can be understood as a physical position, a mental perspective, or a personal interpretation of the world," he explained. "In art, it extends to the technical realm, where perspective involves creating the illusion of three dimensions on a two-dimensional plane through techniques like line, color, and mathematics."

Dixon also connected the theme to contemporary contexts, highlighting how modern uses of point of view particularly in gaming and social media—invite audiences to experience the vantage point of another. "While we can never truly inhabit another's viewpoint, artists have the rare ability to offer glimpses into their way of seeing," Dixon noted. "Their works spark conversation and introspection about how perception shapes our reality."

Artistic Exploration of Perspective

In responding to the theme, the selected artists adopted diverse and inventive approaches. Their sculptures explored illusions, alternate views of reality, the fallibility of perception, and multidimensional perspectives. Some works incorporated historical or cultural narratives, while others invited viewers to reconsider their relationship to the physical environment.

Through form, material, and placement, the artists presented their creations as windows into new ways of seeing. They encouraged viewers to question their own perceptions and interpretations of the world. Whether through intricate sculptural techniques, innovative uses of space, or thought-provoking installations, the works exemplified the theme's multifaceted nature.

A Celebrated Outdoor Exhibition

Artina 2024: A Point of View was on view from September 18 to November 10, 2024, offering audiences an opportunity to experience sculpture in dialogue with the surrounding landscape. The exhibition highlighted the power of art to serve as a bridge between individual perspectives, sparking conversations about how we interpret and engage with the world around us.

Sculpture NOW 2024

WSG Sculptors Featured in *Sculpture NOW* 2024 at McLean Project for the Arts

Nancy Sausser, Curator and Artistic Director of the McLean Project for the Arts, selected sixty-five members of the Washington Sculptors Group to participate in *Sculpture NOW 2024*. This non-thematic exhibition showcased innovative works created within the past two years, including freestanding sculpture, wall- and ceiling-mounted pieces, installations, and multimedia works.

Sausser, known for her thoughtful curation and deep understanding of contemporary sculpture, brought her expertise to the selection process. She has organized over 150 exhibitions and regularly exhibits her own sculptures in the DC area, most recently at IA@A at Hillyer and the Brentwood Arts Exchange.

Sculpture Now Highlights and Reviews

Sculpture NOW 2024 received high praise from reviewers. Former Washington Post art critic Mark Jenkins noted, "Variety is key, both throughout the show and within individual works." He commended the exhibition's range, from sleek formalist pieces to funky assemblages, delicate materials, and works incorporating narrative elements. "One intriguing motif," Jenkins observed, "is an element that appears to be emerging from the whole, intentionally disrupting the sculpture's overall unity."

Among the streamlined works, Jenkins highlighted Lisa Battle's mirrored stoneware forms, Gilbert Ugiansky's elongated steel diamond, and Cristian lanculescu's *Rocket*, which hints at untold stories. On the more experimental side, Heather Harvey's installation *I See a Darkness* combined found materials from Portugal with a painted backdrop, creating a vast and immersive experience.

Katherine Markoski, writing for *East City Arts*, applauded the environmental themes in works like **Emily Fussner**'s *A Small Patch of Care* and **Ann Stoddard**'s *Cloud Currents*, *Indian Creek, Chesapeake Bay Watershed*. Jenkins echoed this sentiment, highlighting the interplay of humanity and nature in **Adjoa J. Burrowes**'s *Entangled Earth* and **Donna McCullough**'s recycled-metal dog sculpture, *Sadie*.

Jenkins and Markoski noted the exhibition's representation of contemporary sculpture in all its diverse forms, with Jenkins observing how even minimalist works took unexpected twists, and Markoski remarking on the synergy of materials and ideas.

Both critics praised the exhibit for showcasing works of exceptional artistry that sparked thought about connection, transformation, and humanity's relationship with the natural world.

The Tom Rooney Award 2024

This year's **Tom Rooney Award**, a \$500 honorarium presented during the *Sculpture Now 2024* opening reception to the artist whose work, as selected by the juror, represents the show's best qualities, was awarded to **Wanjin Kim**, for *Self-Portrait*. This distinctive piece features seventeen wall-mounted copper blocks, with outward-facing relief sculptures depicting parts of the body, internal organs, and the representation of physical conditions. Show reviewer Mark Jenkins described it as "one of the show's standouts," noting Kim's skillful visualization of personal fragmentation.
